EXHIBITORS MUST READ THE FOLLOWING PAGES OF RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BE AWARE OF THE RULES OF THE FAIR

Please note: #2 – time given for entering exhibits

#4 – regarding entry forms #5 – entry fee requirements #6 – prize money deductions

- 1. The show will be open to all in Canada.
- 2. All exhibits for inside departments MUST be received (& ready for judging) before 11:45 a.m. on the first day of the Fair (Friday). Livestock, machinery, etc. for outside to be on grounds by 10:30 a.m. of the second day, (Saturday), unless otherwise stated. Exhibits may be entered on Thursday evening from 7 9 p.m. to avoid congestion on Friday and 8:30 a.m. 11:45 a.m. on Friday.
- No inside or outside exhibits to leave the buildings or grounds until after 4 p.m. on the Sunday, and must be gone by 5 p.m. (unless otherwise stated.)
- 4. Entry forms must be completed and given to the Secretary at time of entry, or prize money cannot and will not be awarded.
- 5. EACH PERSON ENTERING EXHIBITS MUST PAY ONE ANNUAL \$10.00 FEE (unless otherwise stated). THIS FEE allows the person to enter ALL categories in this book (unless otherwise stated). This fee also counts as membership until the November Annual Meeting. Membership Card issued is considered a member's receipt (Note: certain classes have age restrictions & Sections 400 and 500 require additional fees).
- 6. The cost of membership for the following year will be deducted on prize money over \$20.
- 7. Members and Exhibitors will receive a Membership Card which will admit the one person named, to the grounds & buildings on Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday (except for the entertainment tent and Jamboree) when shown to gate personnel.
- All stock and exhibits entered must be the bona fide property of exhibitor.
- All agricultural and garden produce exhibited must be the growth of the current year and grown on the exhibitor's farm and/or garden (unless otherwise stated!)
- 10. No exhibit is to be shown in more than one category.
- 11. Exhibits awarded prizes at any previous exhibition of this Society cannot be entered for competition for the current year, or no prize will be awarded.
- 12. Judges have the authority to withhold the prize for any animal or exhibit they may consider unworthy. Any entry not worthy of a prize will not be given a prize, even if it is the only entry in that category!

- 13. Decisions of the judges are final. Exhibitors openly objecting to such decisions shall forfeit all claims to prizes they may have won.
- 14. No Director or Officer of the Society who may have animals or exhibits entered shall attend the same while being judged without first removing his or her badge, or shall in any way indicate to such Judge that the stock or exhibit belongs to him or her.
- 15. No persons allowed in the ring, except Judges and Manager, and no person is allowed to speak to Judge on duty.
- 16. All livestock on grounds must be under control and no abuse of livestock or poultry is permitted.
- 17. The Society reserves the right to carry out livestock inspection and if an animal for health reasons is not deemed worthy, the animal must be removed from the grounds at direction of the livestock committee.
- 18. The Society reserves the right, in case of a deficit, to pay only such portion of the prize money as conditions of the funds may warrant.
- 19. All prize money for inside exhibits will be paid at the time of pickup (from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.)
- 20. EVERYONE RECEIVING PRIZE MONEY MUST CASH CHEQUES BEFORE OCTOBER 15TH OF THAT YEAR...OR FORFEIT SAME!!!
- 21. While the Directors of the Society agree to take every reasonable precaution to ensure safety of the exhibits sent to the Fair, it must be distinctly understood that the owners are required to assume all risk. Should any exhibit be accidentally lost, damaged, injured or stolen, Directors will render all assistance for recovery of same, but will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or any portion hereof.
- 22. The Society will not be responsible for any accident on the grounds during the Community Fair.

We will collect and retain personal information only for the purposes of our competitions at the Bayfield Fair and/or for sending information such as prize payouts, prize books and from time to time information about upcoming events. The Society will not sell, rent, or lease any personal information collected. 

Two points are given to each successful obstacle cleared before the whistle blows. Driver continues and is timed when rear axle passes the next obstacle. One more point is added if cleared. A disobedience is a refusal, run-out, circle, or break to canter of more than 3 steps. Elimination is going off course or dislodging the start obstacle. Placement is firstly by points and then time.

This section contains the recipes for selected categories.

Scottish Tea Scones (Quick Breads # 1010)

2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar

2 tsp. cream of tartar 1 tsp. baking soda $\frac{3}{4}$ tsp. salt $\frac{1}{2}$ cup shortening

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup raisins or currants 2 eggs slightly beaten (save 2 tsp. of

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup milk egg white for top)

Sift dry ingredients together. Blend in shortening with pastry blender. Add remaining ingredients and mix with fork. Divide into 2 parts and turn onto a floured board. Do not handle or knead.

Flatten with rolling pin into circles about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch or more thick. Cut into triangles and place on greased and floured baking sheet. Spread egg white on top to make a shiny golden glaze. Bake at 400 ° F for 15 minutes.

Honey Cookies

(Cookies #1014)

1 cup margarine 2 cups all-purpose flour 2 cups uncooked rolled oats

3 cup granulated sugar1 tsp. salt

1 egg 1 tsp. cinnamon or nutmeg

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. baking soda 2 cups butterscotch chips (12 oz.)

Cream together margarine, sugar, honey and egg. Combine flour, oats, salt, baking soda, spice and salt and then blend into creamed mixture. Stir in butterscotch chips. Drop from tablespoonful onto greased cookie sheets. Bake in preheated oven at $350\,^{\circ}$ F for 12-14 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen.

Lemon Curd (small batch)

(Jams & Jellies # 1037)

3/4 cup white sugar juice of one large lemon

1 egg 2 Tbsp. butter

Mix together and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Pour into sterilized jar. Will keep 2-3 weeks in the fridge.

Coffee Cake

(Specials # 1041)

Topping Mix (mix all ingredients together):

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup brown sugar $\frac{1}{4}$ cup finely chopped nuts

1 tsp. cinnamon Batter Mix:

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter or margarine 1 cup white sugar

2 eggs Add:

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. baking powder $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. baking soda

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cup sifted cake & pastry flour 1 cup sour cream

Pour 2/3 of batter into well-greased Bundt pan or 8x8 pan and sprinkle with topping. Add the remaining batter and topping alternately. Bake at 350 $^{\circ}$ F for 30 - 35 minutes.

Microwave Pickles

(Specials # 1043)

2 cups small cucumbers (sliced 1/8" 1 cup thinly sliced onions

thick

₹ cup sugar 1 tsp. salt

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. celery seed $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. mustard seed $\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. turmeric $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white vinegar

Put all ingredients in a 2-quart glass cooking dish. Mix well. Microwave 4 minutes on high – stir – microwave 4 more minutes on high. Do not cover dish. Cool. Store in refrigerator in plastic containers, jars etc. Keeps 6-8 months. These pickles can be made year round. In winter, when small pickling cucumbers are not available, long English cucumbers work well.

Microwave Brownies

(Specials #1044)

2 eggs 1 cup sugar

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla extract

In small bowl at medium speed on mixer, beat together the eggs, sugar, salt, and vanilla about 1 minute until light.

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter melted

 $\label{lem:Add_melted_butter.} \textit{ Continue beating until thoroughly blended about 1 minute.}$

 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup unsifted all-purpose flour $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cocoa

Mix in flour and cocoa at low speed

1 cup chopped nuts

Stir in nuts. Spread evenly in greased 8"/20 cm square dish. Microwave at HIGH 6-7 minutes rotating dish $\frac{1}{4}$ turn every 2 minutes. When done, top looks dry and will spring back when lightly touched. Cut when cold.

Blueberry Muffins

(Specials # 1051)

 $1\frac{3}{4}$ cups all-purpose flour $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white sugar

3 tsp. baking powder $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt 1 cup milk 1 egg

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup melted margarine 1 cup frozen blueberries

Stir together dry ingredients and add frozen blueberries. Combine egg, milk, and melted margarine and stir into flour mixture and blueberries, stirring just to moisten. Do not beat. Bake at 350 °F for 20-25 minutes.

Sponge Cake

(Specials # 1052)

5 eggs 1 cup sugar - sifted 1 Tbsp. lemon juice 2 tsp. grated lemon rind $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt 1 cup sifted cake flour

Separate eggs, placing whites in large bowl and yolks in medium size bowl. Beat whites until foamy; add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, 1 Tbsp. at a time, beating well after each addition until meringue stands in soft peaks. Beat yolks well in separate bowl. Gradually add remaining $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, 1 Tbsp. at a time until mixture is thick and lemon coloured. Add lemon juice, rind and salt. Sift flour over yolk mixture; fold in lightly until flour disappears. Fold yolk mixture into meringue. Pour into ungreased tube pan. Bake in 325 °F oven for 50 minutes or until centre springs back when lightly pressed with fingertips. Remove from oven, invert pan and cool. Makes a 9 in. (22 cm) tube cake.

Maple Butter Tarts

(Specials # 1055)

 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup butter softened $\frac{1}{4}$ cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 egg $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp vanilla

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup maple syrup 10 - 12 unbaked tart shells

Cream butter and brown sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Blend in syrup. Pour into tart shells. Bake at 375 °F for 15 - 20 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 10 - 12.

Easy Peanut Butter Cookies

(Specials # 1066)

1 cup peanut butter (any kind) 1 cup sugar (granulated)

1 large egg

Preheat oven 350 $^{\circ}$ F. Mix sugar and egg together, then add peanut butter. Now form into 1"/2.5 cm balls and press with fork. Dip fork into a little sugar so it won't stick. Bake for 10 - 15 minutes at 350 $^{\circ}$ F. Makes 1 dozen cookies.

Chocolate Cake (Iced)

(Specials # 1067)

Line a small pan with oiled wax paper or spray an 8"/20cm square baking pan with cooking spray.

½ cup shortening or margarine 1 cup sugar 1 egg 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat together lightly.

1 1/4 cup flour 1 tsp. baking powder

1 tsp. baking soda ½ cup cocoa

Sift dry ingredients, add to creamed ingredients alternating

1 cup sour milk or buttermilk Bake at 350 °F for 20-30 minutes.

Chocolate Chip Muffins

(Specials # 1068)

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$ cup all-purpose flour $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white sugar

Mix the dry ingredients and add chocolate chips. Combine egg, milk, and butter and stir into the flour mixture. Do not beat, just stir. Bake at 375 $^{\circ}$ F for 20 minutes.


