NOTICE TO EXHIBITORS

EXHIBITORS MUST READ THE FOLLOWING PAGES OF RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BE AWARE OF THE RULES OF THE FAIR

**Please note: #2 – time given for entering exhibits
#4 – regarding entry forms
#5 – entry fee requirements
#6 – prize money deductions**

1. The show will be open to all in Canada.
2. All **exhibits for inside departments MUST be received (& ready for judging) before 11:45 a.m. on the first day of the Fair (Friday)**. Livestock, machinery, etc. for outside to be on grounds by 10:30 a.m. of the second day, (Saturday), unless otherwise stated. Exhibits may be entered on **Thursday evening from 7 – 9 p.m.** to avoid congestion on Friday and **8:30 a.m. – 11:45 a.m. on Friday**.
3. No inside or outside exhibits to leave the buildings or grounds until **after 4 p.m. on the Sunday**, and must be gone by 5 p.m. (unless otherwise stated.)
4. Entry forms must be completed and given to the Secretary at time of entry, or prize money cannot and will not be awarded.
5. EACH PERSON ENTERING EXHIBITS MUST PAY ONE ANNUAL **\$10.00 FEE** (unless otherwise stated). THIS FEE allows the person to enter ALL categories in this book (unless otherwise stated). This fee also counts as membership until the November Annual Meeting. Membership Card issued is considered a member's receipt (Note: certain classes have age restrictions & Sections 400 and 500 require additional fees).
6. The cost of membership for the following year will be deducted on prize money over \$20.
7. Members and Exhibitors will receive a Membership Card which will admit the **one person named, to the grounds & buildings on Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday (except for the entertainment tent and Jamboree) when shown to gate personnel**.
8. All stock and exhibits entered must be the bona fide property of exhibitor.
9. All agricultural and garden produce exhibited must be the growth of the current year and grown on the exhibitor's farm and/or garden (unless otherwise stated!)
10. No exhibit is to be shown in more than one category.
11. An exhibitor can only enter one item in each category as indicated.
12. Exhibits awarded prizes at any previous exhibition of this Society cannot be entered for competition for the current year, or no prize will be awarded.
13. Judges have the authority to withhold the prize for any animal or exhibit they may consider unworthy. Any entry not worthy of a prize will not be given a prize, even if it is the only entry in that category!

14. Decisions of the judges are final. Exhibitors openly objecting to such decisions shall forfeit all claims to prizes they may have won.
15. No Director or Officer of the Society who may have animals or exhibits entered shall attend the same while being judged without first removing his or her badge, or shall in any way indicate to such Judge that the stock or exhibit belongs to him or her.
16. No persons allowed in the ring, except Judges and Manager, and no person is allowed to speak to Judge on duty.
17. All livestock on grounds must be under control and no abuse of livestock or poultry is permitted.
18. The Society reserves the right to carry out livestock inspection and if an animal for health reasons is not deemed worthy, the animal must be removed from the grounds at direction of the livestock committee.
19. The Society reserves the right, in case of a deficit, to pay only such portion of the prize money as conditions of the funds may warrant.
20. **All prize money for inside exhibits will be paid at the time of pickup (from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.)**
21. **EVERYONE RECEIVING PRIZE MONEY MUST CASH CHEQUES BEFORE OCTOBER 15TH OF THAT YEAR...OR FORFEIT SAME!!!**
22. While the Directors of the Society agree to take every reasonable precaution to ensure safety of the exhibits sent to the Fair, it must be distinctly understood that the owners are required to assume all risk. Should any exhibit be accidentally lost, damaged, injured or stolen, Directors will render all assistance for recovery of same, but will not recognize any claim for payment of the value or any portion hereof.
23. The Society will not be responsible for any accident on the grounds during the Community Fair.

Privacy and Security:

The privacy of our exhibitors is never compromised. We will collect and retain personal information only for the purposes of our competitions at the Bayfield Fair and/or for sending information such as prize payouts, prize books and from time to time information about upcoming events. The Society will not sell, rent, or lease any personal information collected. Access is only given to employees and Directors of the Fair who must use the personal information for the reason it was obtained.

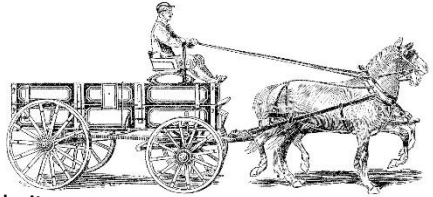

Broccoli: heads should be dark and compact. Avoid yellow flowers. Cut stem 5 in (12 cm) from top of head.

Cabbage: cut stems about ½ in (1 cm) below head. Remove blemished or broken leaves, but care should be taken not to peel heads too much. Wrapper leaves are desirable.

Pickling Cucumbers: Select fruit 2-4 in (5 –10 cm) long and uniform in size, shape, and colour.

Table cucumbers: Select fruit 5-12 in (12 -30 cm) long and uniform in size, shape, and colour.

Kohlrabi: Ball should be 2-3 in (5 – 7 cm) in diameter. Remove roots just below the ball and trim all leaves 2-3 in (5 – 7 cm) in length. Clean them but not wash them.

Garlic, Onions: Select mature and cured specimens. Neck should be dry and small. Only remove broken or coloured skin. Trim roots to ½ in (1 cm) and top to 2 in (5 cm). Do not wash.

Microwave Pickles

(Specials # 1043)

2 cups small cucumbers (sliced 1/8" thick)	1 cup thinly sliced onions
$\frac{3}{4}$ cup sugar	1 tsp. salt
$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. celery seed	$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. mustard seed
$\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. turmeric	$\frac{1}{2}$ cup white vinegar

Put all ingredients in a 2-quart glass cooking dish. Mix well. Microwave 4 minutes on high - stir - microwave 4 more minutes on high. Do not cover dish. Cool. Store in refrigerator in plastic containers, jars etc. Keeps 6-8 months. These pickles can be made year round. In winter, when small pickling cucumbers are not available, long English cucumbers work well.

Microwave Brownies

(Specials #1044)

2 eggs	1 cup sugar
$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt	1 tsp. vanilla extract

In small bowl at medium speed on mixer, beat together the eggs, sugar, salt, and vanilla about 1 minute until light.

$\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter melted

Add melted butter. Continue beating until thoroughly blended about 1 minute.

$\frac{3}{4}$ cup unsifted all-purpose flour	$\frac{1}{2}$ cup cocoa

Mix in flour and cocoa at low speed

1 cup chopped nuts

Stir in nuts. Spread evenly in greased 8"/20 cm square dish. Microwave at HIGH 6-7 minutes rotating dish $\frac{1}{4}$ turn every 2 minutes. When done, top looks dry and will spring back when lightly touched. Cut when cold.

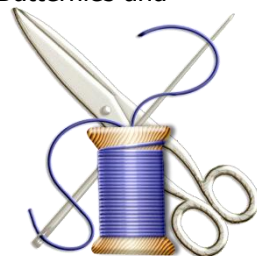

Bake for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from oven. Add raisins and cool. Store in an airtight container.
