- All exhibits for inside departments MUST be received (& ready for judging) before
  11:45 a.m. on the first day of the Fair (Friday). Livestock, machinery, etc. for outside to
  be on grounds by 10:30 a.m. of the second day, (Saturday), unless otherwise stated.
  Exhibits may be entered on Thursday evening from 7 9 p.m. to avoid congestion on
  Friday and 8:30 a.m. 11:45 a.m. on Friday.
- No inside or outside exhibits to leave the buildings or grounds until after 4 p.m. on the Sunday, and must be gone by 5 p.m. (unless otherwise stated.)
- Entry forms must be completed and given to the Secretary at time of entry, or prize money cannot and will not be awarded.
  - Note: An online entry form can be completed prior to the Fair <a href="https://www.assistexpo.ca/bayfield-agricultural-society">https://www.assistexpo.ca/bayfield-agricultural-society</a> (Please review the timelines provided at the link).
- 5. EACH PERSON ENTERING EXHIBITS MUST PAY ONE ANNUAL \$5.00 FEE (unless otherwise stated). THIS FEE allows the person to enter ALL categories in this book (unless otherwise stated). This fee also counts as membership until the November Annual Meeting. Membership Card issued is considered a member's receipt (Note: certain classes have age restrictions & Sections 400 and 500 require additional fees).
- 6. The cost of membership for the following year will be deducted on prize money over \$20.
- 7. All stock and exhibits entered must be the bona fide property of exhibitor.
- All agricultural and garden produce exhibited must be the growth of the current year and grown on the exhibitor's farm and/or garden (unless otherwise stated!)
- 9. No exhibit is to be shown in more than one category.
- 10. An exhibitor can only enter one item in each category as indicated.
- 11. Exhibits awarded prizes at any previous exhibition of this Society cannot be entered for competition for the current year, or no prize will be awarded.

- 12. Judges have the authority to withhold the prize for any animal or exhibit they may consider unworthy. Any entry not worthy of a prize will not be given a prize, even if it is the only entry in that category!

- 201. Open Pleasure Driving Working Single Hitch Judged on suitability to provide a pleasant drive at walk, slow trot, working trot, and strong trot, to stand quietly in line, and to rein back. Judged 70% on performance, manners, and way of going, 20% on condition and fit of harness, and 10% on neatness of attire.
- 202. Open Pleasure Driving Working Double Hitch (pair)
  Judged on suitability to provide a pleasant drive at walk, slow trot, working
  trot, and strong trot, to stand quietly in line, and to rein back. Judged 70% on
  performance, manners, and way of going, 20% on condition and fit of
  harness, and 10% on neatness of attire.
- 203. Pole Bending (either hitch)

Drivers will pass through Start markers weave through poles, turn around last pole,

and come back weaving through the poles. Once through finish line, clock stops.

Course faults will be a 5 second penalty added for each pole knocked over.

#### 204. Scurry Obstacle (timed event - either hitch)

Driver passes through Start markers from either direction and then proceeds through 10 obstacles from either direction, in any order. Each obstacle must be driven only once. On completion the driver must pass through the Finish markers from either direction with time recorded. No penalty for refusal and run-outs. Course faults will be scored as penalty seconds and added to the driver's time. Placings are determined on a low total time basis. A tie will be broken with a drive-off. NO CANTERING IS ALLOWED.

#### 205. Derby - timed event (either hitch)

Driver follows a prescribed course of 12 obstacles. After passing through the starting line, the driver proceeds through each obstacle in order to the designated finish line. Course faults as assessed as penalty seconds and are added to the driver's elapsed time. Placings are determined on a low total time basis over 2 rounds if time permits.

- **Broccoli:** heads should be dark and compact. Avoid yellow flowers. Cut stem 5 in (12 cm) from top of head.
- Cabbage: cut stems about 1/2 in/1 cm below head. Remove blemished or broken leaves, but care should be taken not to peel heads too much.
   Wrapper leaves are desirable.
- **Pickling Cucumbers**: Select fruit 2-4 in/5-10 cm long and uniform in size, shape and colour.
- **Table Cucumbers**: Select fruit 5-12 in/12-30 cm long and uniform in size, shape and colour.
- Kohlrabi: Ball should be 2-3 in/5-7 cm in diameter. Remove roots just below the ball and trim all leaves 2-3 in/5-7 cm in length. Clean them but do not wash.
- Garlic, Onions: Select mature and cured specimens. Neck should be dry and small. Only remove broken or coloured skin. Trim roos to 1/2 in/1 cm and top to 2 in/5 cm. Do not wash.
- Tomatoes, Peppers: Trim stems to 1/2 in/1 cm.

250 ml shredded coconut 125 ml raisins

50 ml brown sugar

Preheat over to 150 degrees C (300 degrees F).

Mix together rolled oats, wheat germ, sunflower seeds, sesame seeds, and coconut in a large bowl.

In a small bowl, combine brown sugar, honey, cooking oil, vanilla and salt.

Add the honey mixture to the dry ingredients and blend thoroughly.

Spread mixture in a large, shallow baking pan.

Bake for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from oven.

Add raisins and cool. Store in an airtight containter.
